Sir ze sall resaif yis writ and trewlie at my Lordis depairting  
I fand him weill myndit towart zow and becauss he left me heid over  
his comontis<sup>2</sup> and vyer besenes quhill aucht or ten dayis eftir Andressmess.  
I writ to the Lard of Tullibardin rycht lairglie in zour cause  
for quhilk I ame swir to resaif litill thank of him bot I will  
beir with yat quhill eftir warttis. I think it best ze mak ane guid  
answer towart this wyer writting and satefie my Lordis desyre  
yarin nochtwithstanding ony prosedingis ze hef done with ye rest. For ye  
weill of all zour effaris as this present standis and able the  
man will do as the rest hes done quhoum we leift  
Weyme. It will pleis zow adverteiss of all zour nowellis of ye  
west hand. I sall nocht feill God willing gif ze remane in  
Balloch to speik with zow or my depairting to Edinburgh  
quhilk wilbe within aucht or ten dayis efter Andessmess at ye farrest.

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<sup>1</sup> The letter twice mentions St Andrews Day, 30 November, and seems from the reference to Tullibardine's hostility to be written in 1565. The style is similar to Grandtully's other letters and mentions the recipient remaining at Balloch Castle, which indicates Grey Colin.
