Rycht honorable Sir efter hertlie commendationis. Forsamekill as I haif resawit zour writting fra yis berair desyrand me to send unto zow of my frendis sax abill men tobe in houshald with zow and my fostersone.<sup>1</sup> And as to that I am to pass ye morne with certane freindis of myne to my bruther soneis mariaige to Buit and culd nocht guidlie send sik ane nummer of honest men with sik ane sort warnyng becaus ye maist part of my freindis yat ar abill men gangis with my self at yis present. And I sall nocht faill God willing to speik waray sortlie with my Lord of Ergyll and sall luik waray effectuslie gif I may obtein leif fra his Lordship fra all maneir of oisting. And gif I may obteyne leif I sall nocht faill God willing to cum unto zow waray sortlie with sik nummer of honest men as I sall think resonable to wait upon zour service and my fostoris. Nocht ellis bot God haif zow in his keiping. Of Duntroune ye xxvij day of July threscoir ten zeres.
