## Why GIRFEC?

Many children still have poor life chances from an early age System failures in:

- · information sharing,
- assessment
- resource allocation
- review processes
- · Children and families having to tell their stories again and again
- · Practitioners drowning in bureaucracy
- Some children and families excluded from services
- · Too many children at risk of harm and neglect

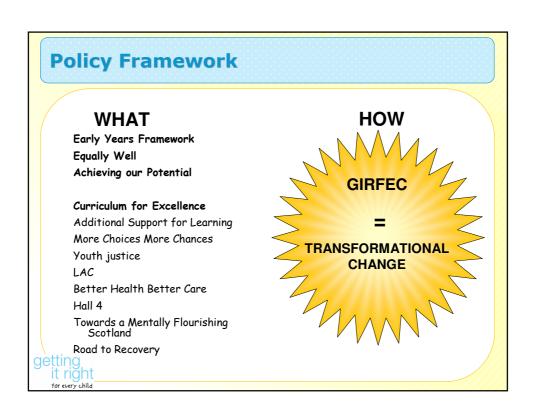


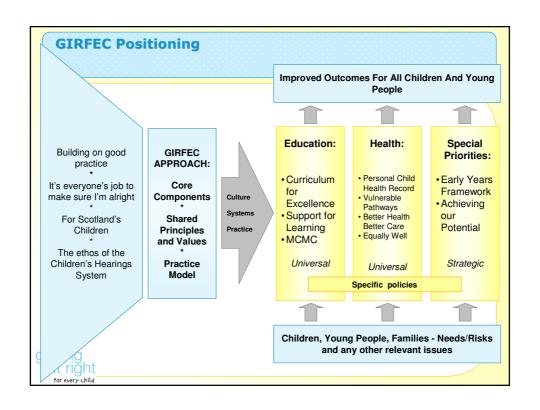
#### What is GIRFEC?

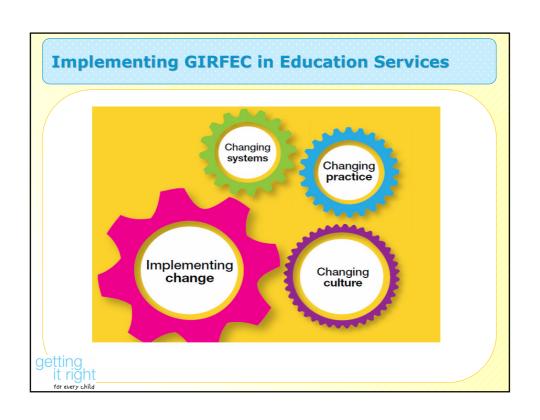
- · Getting it right for every child:
- the national programme that aims to improve outcomes for all children and young people plus and integral role for children, young people and families.
- across children's and young peoples services 'Getting It Right for Every Child' is the new approach which puts the child/young person at the centre.
- It affects all services that impact on children and young people (i.e. adult services working with parents/carers)
- It builds from universal services: moving crisis intervention to early intervention and prevention
- It streamlines processes and promotes best practice on information sharing











# The core components of Getting it right for every child

- Focus on improving outcomes for young people, based on shared understanding of well-being
- 2. Common approach to gaining consent and sharing information where appropriate
- 3. Integral role for children, young people and families
- 4. Co-ordinated approach to assessing needs, agreeing actions and outcomes, based on the Well-being Indicators
- 5. Streamlined planning, assessment and decision making leading to the right help at the right time



#### The 10 Core Components (continued)

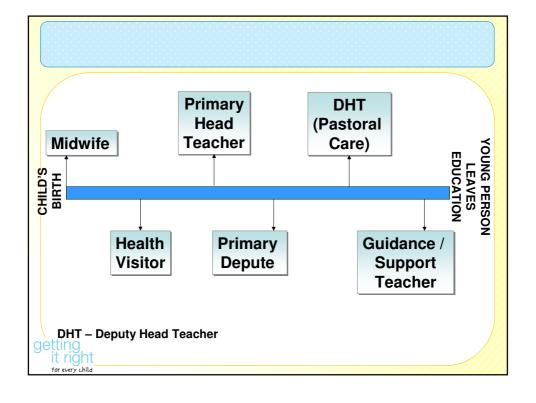
- 6. High standards of co-operative working and communication
- A Named Person for all children and
  A Lead Professional to co-ordinate multi-agency activity
- 8. Maximising the skilled workforce within universal
- 9. A confident and competent workforce across all services
- 10. Capacity to share demographic, assessment, and planning information electronically



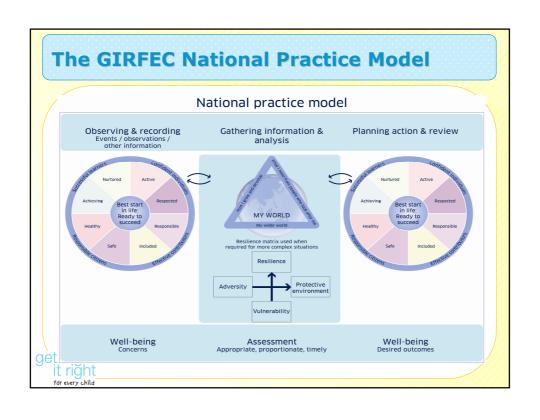
#### **Named Person**

- ·Work within Universal Services
- •First point of contact for child, parent, professionals & members of the community
- ·Make sure child's views are sought
- ·Maintain the Child's Record in their own agency
- ·Plan with the child and family if extra help is needed (single agency)
- When child needs extra help, prepare a plan based on appropriate and proportionate get information

for every child







#### **Learning from pathfinder and partners**

- > 2/3rds of children with a Child's Plan showed improvements in well-being
- > 50% fewer children on CPR- but more with plans
- > Decrease in non-offence referrals to the children's reporter of 70 %
- Average tariff score of the lowest attaining 20% of S4 pupils in Highland exceed the average scores for the lowest 20% across Scotland as a whole
- > The length of time children are looked after away from home is beginning to fall.
- Fife 53% reduction in non offence referrals to the children's reporter.
- Fife 30% reduction in out of authority placements



#### Learning from pathfinder

- > Education, health and social workers all being asked for fewer reports
- > Social work have reported an improvement in the appropriateness of requests for their involvement and that plans are now outcome focused.
- > Overall, Agencies -
  - freed up staff to spend more time supporting children, instead of writing reports;
  - improved information sharing and reduced bureaucracy.



#### **Benefits - learning so far**

- ·Early evidence of culture shift
- ·Fewer referrals to panel = fewer reports
- •Streamlined bureaucracy = fewer forms
- ·Formalisation of current role Named Person
- ·Better access to resources
- ·Clarity around role of Lead Professional
- Progress with information sharing

#### **Legislation - Children's Services Bill**

SNP Manifesto Commitment - 2011

"We will put early years approach on a new footing... What's more we will review the Childrens (Scotland) Act to bring it up to date and we will introduce new legislation that creates an obligation on councils, the health service and government to deliver early years services and to see early years education as an essential part of the learning journey.

"That legislation will ensure that the Getting it Right for Every Child approach is developed nationwide. That will enshrine in law a duty for all health boards, councils and other agencies, to work together irrespective of bureaucratic boundaries and place the child at the centre of how they deliver services."
