

What have we learned from fifty years of Scottish comprehensive schooling?

Tuesday 27th October 2015, 9.00am -1.30pm Godfrey Thomson Hall, Thomson's Land, Moray House School of Education

The 27th October 2015 is the 50th anniversary of the introduction of comprehensive education in Britain. While the ideal of comprehensive education has been largely abandoned in England, comprehensive schools are alive and well in Scotland and command public support. But the Scottish system's success is still only partial.

This conference will provide a reflective long-term overview of the experience of comprehensive schooling in Scotland. Drawing on a wide range of research, it will ask to what extent Scottish comprehensive schooling has realised the underlying values of Liberty, Equality and Fraternity. It aims to promote discussion about the difficult educational and policy issues that face the Scottish system in trying to offer the best educational opportunities and experiences for all young people aged 11-18.
