Dr Fergus Cullen is a Reader in Galaxy Evolution at the University of Edinburgh; his research focuses on finding and characterising galaxies in the early Universe. Fergus received his PhD from Edinburgh in 2015 and worked as a post-doctoral researcher between 2015-2021. In 2021 Fergus was awarded an ERC Starting Grant to study the chemical evolution of distant galaxies. The grant funding (converted to a UKRI Frontier Research Guarantee grant) began in September 2022 and he is now in the process of building his own research group at the Institute for Astronomy.
